Parent/Caregiver Power: The First and Most Important Early Childhood Educator

Did you know your words can turn exercise into an adventure? As parents/caregivers, we have the power to make movement magical! When you cheer, "Wow, you're hopping like a kangaroo!" or "You're running so fast!" you're not just praising—you're planting seeds of confidence and joy. Positive language helps kids see physical activity as fun, not a chore, and builds a lifelong love of movement.

The trick is simple: swap "Stop running!" for "Let's find a safe space to run and have fun!" and watch the smiles appear. Specific, encouraging words like "I love how you're climbing that jungle gym!" make kids feel proud and motivated. These little changes create big results—open communication, happy hearts, and active bodies. So sprinkle your day with positive phrases and turn every hop, skip, and jump into a celebration!

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Parenting Tip of the Month

Rethinking the Term "Picky Eater"

As children start eating solid foods, it's normal for their likes and dislikes to change, and they may be cautious about trying new foods. Instead of labeling them as "picky eaters," which can influence how they see themselves, use language that builds confidence and trust. Research shows it can take more than 15 exposures for a child to accept a food, so keep offering a variety in positive ways—serve new foods alongside familiar ones, try different preparations, and let children decide what and how much to eat. Avoid pressure or negative phrases; instead, use encouraging, specific comments like "You're running so fast!" or "I love how you're climbing that jungle gym!" This approach creates a supportive environment, fosters healthy eating habits, and helps children develop a positive relationship with food over time.





- **Instructions:**

Seasons of the Moon

Xets'ō:westel November 25 - December 24 - Time to store away paddles for the winter

The second month is Xets'ō:westel which means "time to store away canoe paddles"; xets' means store away (for winter), ō:wes means canoe paddles and tel means a device for doing something, in this case, time. At this time, around November, the ice and snow is starting to make river travel by canoe hard or impossible, so the Stó:lō store away their canoes by turning them over or putting them in sheds; the paddles are usually stored under the canoe or inside. Another name for this month is Telxits which means leaves are falling.
